
CORNWALL CROQUET CLUB

Where has the time gone? I would normally send out a Newsletter in June, but things have been quite busy this year, so apologies if you have been eagerly scanning your email lists every day to no avail.

I suppose the first thing to mention would be not 'the elephant in the room', but 'the new building at the club' (let's call it the 'cabin' for now). What a job we have had getting as far as we are with it. Having received planning permission and approval of our grant application we hoped to have it up and running by the beginning of the 2018 season, but the weather had different ideas. The very wet winter and spring delayed groundwork being prepared by the builder and then made it impossible for a lorry to drive onto the site to deliver the cabin. Even when we did risk it the lorry succeeded in getting itself bogged down and Trevor (acting as unpaid clerk of works on that day!) had to call upon a farmer friend to come with his tractor and help. Since then the weather turned full circle and delayed our getting the finishing touches to the decking - building steps at the end and sorting out the drop at the front. Despite these setbacks I hope you feel this has been a worthwhile project which will enhance the facilities at our club. Having travelled to several clubs this season for SW Federation league matches I can safely say that our facilities, including all buildings and lawns, are excellent compared to many.

I am happy to say that we have now received our 50% grant for the cost of the cabin from the Croquet Association.

So, what's been going on since the last Newsletter? The winter indoor games sessions continued despite some very cold weather and, of course, that event which is rapidly becoming a permanent fixture in our club calendar - 'Pasty and Pud'. This was held in early March and provided a much appreciated opportunity for members to get together in that long hard winter.

What came next? Well we managed to open for the 2018 season on 31st March despite the very wet weather over the previous few months. Thanks in no small measure to the members of the Grounds Sub-Committee

and the volunteers who do so much to keep our club looking so good. When we have visiting teams coming for matches they often admire our site and the condition of the lawns and are surprised to hear that it is all done by volunteers from the club.

Thinking of volunteers, there seems to be a very small number of ladies (yes, it is all ladies who do it, but it doesn't have to be) who keep the clubhouse and toilets clean. I am sure there are others who could help with this and fill up the gaps in the list on the wall by the microwave. Please do try to help if you can.

At the beginning of the season we welcomed a team from East Dorset Croquet Club to a friendly match. This was a very informal affair which I am happy to say Cornwall won. A very enjoyable day and a good result. Some of the East Dorset members enjoyed their visit so much that they returned on one of the Open Afternoons to play.

Publicity

Reminders

A reminder - again - about locking up. We now have two more doors to lock - the cabin. Both of these doors have double locks so please do not give up turning the key until you have felt the lock operate

twice.

There have been instances recently of lights being left on in the toilets and the large parasol base being left out. Please just open the toilet doors to check lights and taps before locking up.

The parasol base has already damaged the new decking by being dragged across it. It is heavy so to protect both the decking and your own health get someone to share the load and help you.

Safety In the hot weather we have all been drinking more water and squash. This means glasses are being taken outside, so care needs to be taken not to leave them where they can be broken. We have a small number of plastic tumblers which are the much safer option for outdoor use.

Corner flags. It was only when I started marking the courts' white lines that I became aware of the correct positioning of corner flags, so I thought perhaps others may also be unaware of this. The corner flags must be placed in each of the four corners of the lawn and must the touch the inside edge of the white lines. They should not be placed on or outside of the line itself.
